## July 18-21 Carbondale, IL and July 25-28 San Antonio, TX




From Luther . . .

[Luther speaks of how to view Baptism as the precious treasure it is.]

One must not hold baptism in low esteem, as do the devil's sectarians, who make of it simply a sign, but rather highly honor and exalt it as our

highest and most precious treasure. And this despite the fact that we see nothing of it but the water and hear no more than the words spoken by the baptizer, of whom we cannot know whether he himself believes or not, which, as has been said, neither takes anything from baptism nor harms you. For I should not and will not stake it all upon what the minister is or believes. Rather, if I am to be certain of my baptism, I must look to the Founder and listen to what his Word and command say. True, the minister must be there, he must lend his hand and mouth; but I must not allow my attention to be fixed upon the visible baptizer, but rather upon the unseen Baptizer, who instituted and ordained the baptism; to him I must look, no matter who the minister may be.

#### From St. Athanasius . . .

(St. Athanasius speaks of how the baptism of Jesus was for our sake and benefit, not His own.)

If then for our sake He sanctifies Himself, and does this when He is become man, it is very plain that the Spirit's descent on Him in Jordan was a descent upon us, because of His bearing our body. And it

did not take place for promotion to the Word, but again for our sanctification, that we might share His anointing, and of us it might be said, 'Know ye not that ye are God's Temple, and the Spirit of God dwelleth in you?' For when the Lord, as man, was washed in Jordan, it was we who were washed in Him and by Him. And when He received the Spirit, we it was who by Him were made recipients of It.



### On the Catechism . . .

For the first portion of the Pentecost season, our Catechism focus is on Holy Baptism, for it is in Baptism that the Holy Spirit comes to us, we are born again in Christ, made children of God, and receive all the gifts of God.

#### Holy Baptism: What is Baptism?

Baptism is not just plain water, but it is the water included in God's command and combined with God's word.

#### Which is that word of God?

Christ our Lord says in the last chapter of Matthew: "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." Matthew 28:19

Now, as I have often said, God's Word teaches us that the sacrament of baptism has three parts. The first is just natural water . . . but there is something more which is added to it, which makes this water glorious and holy, makes it in fact the real baptism, namely: The second part, God's Word beside and with the water . . . When these words are added to the water. then it is no longer simply water like other water, but a holy, divine, blessed water. For where the Word of God, by which he created heaven and earth and all things, is present, there God himself is present with his power and might. . . . Then there is a third part which is necessary to make it a sacrament, namely, institution or the Word which institutes and ordains baptism. . . . Therefore in baptism do not look to the minister's hand, which takes simple water, and his mouth, which speaks a few words over it . . . But rather look to the Word and act of God . . . who is himself the baptizer. That's why it has such power.

Holy Gospel: Matthew 28:16–20 (The Great Commission.) Office Hymn: LSB #954 "We All Believe in One True God"

#### **Commemoration of St. Barnabas** (June 11):

Holy Gospel: Mark 6:7–13 (Jesus sends out the twelve.) Office Hymn: LSB #837 "Lift High the Cross"

#### Pentecost 3 (June 18):

Holy Gospel: Matthew 9:35-10:8 (Jesus has compassion.) Office Hymn: LSB #834 "O God, O Lord of Heaven and Earth"

#### Pentecost 4 (June 25):

Holy Gospel: Matthew 10:5a, 21–33 (Expect persecution!) Office Hymn: LSB #659 "Lord of Our Life"

#### Pentecost 5 (July 2):

Holy Gospel: Matthew 10:34–42 (Expect division!) Office Hymn: LSB #685 "Let Us Ever Walk with Jesus"

#### Pentecost 6 (July 9):

Holy Gospel: Matthew 11:25–30 (The weary come to Jesus.) Office Hymn: LSB #684 "Come Unto Me, Ye Weary"

#### **Pentecost 7** (July 16):

Holy Gospel: Matthew 13:1–9, 18–23 (Parable of the Sower.) Office Hymn: LSB #577 "Almighty God, Your Word Is Cast"

#### Pentecost 8 (July 23):

Holy Gospel: Matthew 13:24–30, 36–43 (Parable of the Weeds.) Office Hymn: LSB #663 "Rise, My Soul, to Watch and Pray"

#### Pentecost 9 (July 30):

Holy Gospel: Matthew 13:44–52 (Parable of the hidden treasure) Office Hymn: LSB #851 "Lord of Glory, You Have Bought Us"

<u>Note</u>: The Liturgy for the Festival of the Holy Trinity (June 4) is **Divine Service 1** (p. 151). The Liturgy beginning with the Commemoration of St. Barnabas (June 11) is **Divine Service 4** (p. 203).
